A Message from Our Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,

How many of you remember writing the essay, “How I Spent My Summer Vacation”? For me, the summer highlight would definitely be the service retreat to Harlan, Kentucky that I took with our youth and adult volunteers July 13-19.

What did I learn? First, I learned that the twenty youth (ages 13-18) and five adult volunteers who participated in this year’s retreat are great fun. Whether rebuilding a porch, roofing a shelter, cooking and sharing our meals, spending time around the campfire, playing our ukuleles, or hiking through the woods, they will keep you singing, smiling, and appreciative.

In fact, this year we encountered a couple of days with rain, and some of our lodging accommodations were not overly commodious. We had to be flexible and creative. Yet, never once did I hear a complaint. Rather, we looked on the bright side and gave thanks for what we had and our time together. Indeed, just the natural beauty of the mountains, rivers, and lakes is a gift to enjoy.

I also learned that our veteran youth have woodworking skills that far exceed the skills I learned in my eighth grade shop class! With their help and that of the other adult leaders, I discovered a sense of satisfaction as I learned the methods of construction, proper and safe use of tools, problem-solving, and teamwork. Oh yes, the old adage, “measure twice, cut once” also came into play each day!

The people of Harlan County were also great teachers for me. Their welcoming presence allowed us to feel at ease immediately, although their friendly chatter also put us on

a slower pace of work than we might have been accustomed. We definitely learned the importance of being both “Mary” and “Martha” when it came time to support each other. Our goal was not simply to “get the job done.” Our goal was to make a connection when possible with the families we were serving.

Furthermore, my time in Harlan helped me realize that we were not alone in our efforts. We encountered many other groups also reaching out to serve our neighbors in Appalachia. In fact, a seminarian from our diocese, Andrew Wellman, drove a couple hours from the Fr. Beiting Center in Louisa, Kentucky to share with us his vocation story, sense of service, and the details of his summer internship in Appalachia.

Finally, I learned a few more country songs—probably the weakest link in my musical repertoire. In particular, I discovered that Brad Paisley’s hit from the other year, “You’ll Never Leave Harlan Alive” just isn’t true. But sadly, what is true is this: songs from my high school days in the early 80’s are now considered “Classic Rock”!

"I would never want to serve in a parish that didn't have a school." I remember Fr. Joe Steinbauer saying that to me in a conversation we had near the end of his tenure at All Saints. Two Financial Peace University Series Offered This Fall

We hear constantly about making sure that God has a place in your life... but Ken Hermes wants to help you to be sure that God's plans are in your budget.

Ken says he feels called to help others by volunteering to lead seminars to help us all learn that God teaches us about family and personal finances as well.

A simple teaching program, designed by Dave Ramsey, a nationally known expert on family and personal finances, was offered last winter, and reports are that the participants have benefitted greatly, by adopting the Dave Ramsey way of money management.

Nationally, the Dave Ramsey seminars have been used by over 1.5 million people. Participants gather in a community setting and view a series of DVDs and then can discuss the content.

Ken makes the point that he is not the teacher, he is the presenter and moderator. Dave Ramsey's DVDs are the teaching tools, combined with a workbook and study kit used by the viewers.

The flyer being distributed in our parish bulletins makes the

point that "This isn't your typical money class." Financial Peace University is practical, entertaining and fun! The average family completing the course pays off \$5,300 and saves \$2,700 in just 90 days.

The basic program in the "Financial Peace University" uses over 800 Bible verses to underline its points and is touted as a basic Christian life style.

A separate program from Dave Ramsey group, the "Legacy Journey," is also being offered. The Legacy Program focuses on a deeper look at what the Bible has to say about wealth. It gives a biblical framework and practical tools for managing your resources and living a more generous life.

Topics covered include estate planning, stocks, bonds, mutual funds and annuities. The Financial Peace University series begins Sunday, September 7 and ends Sunday, November 2. The Legacy Journey series begins Monday, September 8, and ends Monday, November 3.

A preview of both programs will be offered after all Masses on August 30 and 31.


