## Visitors to Homebound Come Bearing Special Gifts

On any given weekend, there are a dozen or so individuals who visit parishioners in their homes because they are not able to attend weekly Mass. These visitors come bearing not only the gift of Holy Communion, but they also bring with them the gifts of compassion, understanding, patience and friendship. Whether it is ministering Holy Communion, listening to tales of old, or uttering a tender word of encouragement, these people bridge the gap between the parish community and the person they are visiting. What starts as a service to the homebound often turns into more of a friendly relationship, blurring the lines between the “giver” and the “receiver.” I had the opportunity to interview three “pairs” of parishioners who have formed a special bond as a result of these home visits.

As I talked to Gloria Liedigk and Sue Mikolajczyk, it became obvious that these ladies have shared many memories and become fast friends. Gloria has been taking Communion to Sue for over eight years. They have shared the death of Sue’s husband, the weddings and births in Gloria’s family, and they even took up knitting together. According to Sue, “Gloria takes the loneliness out of Sunday afternoons. We talk and talk, and before you know it two or three hours have gone by!” Gloria has taken her two young grandsons with her to visit Sue and both ladies agree (with chuckles) that this has definitely given them some lively memories.

Another set of parishioners who have come to enjoy each other’s company over the years is Barb Richards and Amelia Boris. Barb has been taking Communion to Mrs. Boris for a little over 2 years. In addition to Sundays, Barb oftentimes makes a visit during the week to bring Communion to

Mrs. Boris. Mrs. Boris (who is in her 90’s) moved to Rossford when she was 6 years old and, according to Barb, is a “walking history book.” Although Mrs. Boris is proud of her 7 children and their families who visit her often, she credits Barb as the “person who keeps her connected to the parish.”

As the coordinator for the Ministers of Care, Joanne Loolen is the perfect person to visit Daniel Dudek. Many of you may know Dan as one of the ushers at 8:30 a.m. Mass. In October Dan had surgery to replace both knees. After a short time in a rehab center, Dan was discharged to home. He contacted the Parish Office to ask if he could receive Communion at home. Joanne was quick to respond and plans to continue her visits with Dan until the weather breaks and he is able to come to Mass again. In a recent phone conversation Dan mentioned that he not only appreciates receiving Holy Communion but he also enjoys Joanne’s company. And the good news is that Dan hopes to be able to usher again by Easter!

## A Message from Our Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,

I nearly jumped out of bed when the bells went off at 5:00 am. Was this a dream or a nightmare? Suddenly I remembered that I was at Mount Angel Abbey south of Portland, Oregon. I had just begun my retreat and was now being summoned to vigils—prayer in the middle of the night.

Even though I was not fully awake as I sauntered into my choir stall, I was able to catch a glimpse of something I never expected to see. A monk situated just in front of me had a tattoo on his neck. It was a red heart topped by a crown. As our chanting of the prayer continued I realized that this monk was in not in that grouping of Americans with just one tattoo, his were legion.

In fact, later that day, this most uncommon monk served me at table in the refectory. I caught a glimpse of his knuckles as he passed me the soup tureen. They read "HOLD FAST." A spider web covered the top of his left

hand and on his right was a woman with long flowing hair.

Since our meals were taken in silence I could not inquire, but only ponder this most unusual monk. What was his story? How did he get in? Why am I noticing all of this during my retreat? What is God revealing to me?

Eventually I was able to learn that this monk's name is Brother Andre Love.

His work at the monastery is to be an iconographer and curator of their museum and art collection. Since I had my computer along, I googled his name and found his story *Tattoo Artist Turned Monk: Not Your Typical Art Story*.

Written by a reporter from the local paper, the article is complete with photos and images of conversion during his most dramatic life. The photos were the ones I would love to have taken, but knew I could not. The pieces of his life were the answers to the questions that were raised each time I gathered for prayer in the choir stall behind him or at table in the refectory with him.

Perhaps more importantly, here I am two weeks later and still contemplating his story of conversion. I believe it will be the image of my Lenten journey to which I was summoned on Ash Wednesday: *Repent and believe in the Gospel*.

## Bishop Thomas to Conduct Confirmation Rite at All Saints May 9th

On Saturday, May 9, at the 4:30pm Mass, 27 eighth graders from All Saints School and the parish PREP program will receive the sacrament of Confirmation from Bishop Daniel Thomas. This will be the culmination of a preparation program that started last September. The program is under the leadership of Sue Van Hersett, Pastoral Associate for Faith Formation.

During the last seven months the candidates, along with their parents and sponsors, have been participating in events to help them reflect on their faith and demonstrate by their actions that they are fully committed to their Catholic faith. This will confirm the decision to be a Catholic that was made for them at their Baptism.

The first event was an all-day retreat for the candidates followed by a Mass with their parents. The next step was an enrollment ceremony involving the candidates and their sponsors. A Confirmation sponsor has three very important roles: (1) to be a role model in faith, (2) to be a companion on the candidate's faith journey and (3) to witness for the candidate before the Church. At this enrollment ceremony the candidate and the sponsor committed themselves to fully participate in the preparation program. There were also group discussion sessions involving candidates, sponsors and parents during the preparation program.

During preparation, program candidates were required to do 10-20 hours of service work for the parish. Examples of this service work were serving at the Senior Prom, assisting with the Giving Tree project, and doing work in the Franciscan Garden.

As a part of the preparation process each candidate selected a saint's name and researched that saint's life in order to create a role model. At the Confirmation Mass Bishop Thomas will confer that name on the candidate and sign him/her on the forehead with Sacred Chrism oil while exhorting the person to "Be sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit." Each sponsor will show support and witness for the candidate by placing a hand on the candidate's shoulder during the Confirmation rite.

It would be a wonderful gesture of support from our parish family to fill the church for the Confirmation ceremony. Mark your calendars NOW, and make a firm commitment to come support the youth of our parish on May 9th, as they take this important step on their spiritual journey.

### Adult Faith Formation Team Formed

As part of its strategic planning, the Pastoral Council of All Saints Parish formed an Adult Faith Formation Team under the leadership of our Pastoral Associate, Sue Van Hersett. The team was charged with developing a planned program that would serve the spiritual growth needs of the adults in the parish. This is no small task.

Such a program would take time to develop and implement, but where to start? What types of activities would be both attractive and effective? What direction should the activities take? What are the spiritual interests of the adults in the parish? Are these interests consistent across the various age groups? These are the kinds of questions that the team hoped to answer with its recent survey.

The survey was promoted at all the Masses on the weekend of January 24-25, and was included in the bulletin. It was given to parents of children both in the school and in the PREP Program, as well as being posted on the parish web site. As of February 16, about 70 surveys were returned. (You can still return yours to the office if you desire!) While the information collected is still being studied by the Adult Faith Formation Team, some preliminary results can be reported.

Survey returns reflected every age group of adults in the parish, but the majority of returns were made by the 50 years and older generation. These "empty nesters" and retirees seemed to convey that they had more time available than younger parents who are ferrying children to numerous activities. No surprise there. This age group was also more available on weekday mornings than younger adults, but the preference still seemed to be for weekday evenings. Weekend times were not very popular with any group. There did not seem to be any clear preference, however, for a specific day nor for a specific type of activity.

Responses were spread over a broad spectrum. This poses a challenge for the team. Some experimentation may need to be done in the early stages to see what types of activities actually draw more participants.

The good news is that, unlike the area of logistics, the area of topics showed clear preferences. The two topics of “Sacred Scripture [Bible]” and “Spirituality” both drew twice as many priority responses as did any of the other topics listed on the survey. This may be because the largest demographic responding to the survey [50+] did not receive as much education about the Bible as our younger generations have. Regardless of the reason, this gives the team a clear focus and direction for its planning. It is an even stronger message if one considers that these two topics are closely related. As Catholics, our spirituality, prayer, and devotion are all heavily rooted in Sacred Scripture. So look for the Adult Faith Formation Team to start by offering Bible oriented programs for spiritual growth.
